The other decisions taken by the Conference are presented similarly.

APPLICATION BY THE REPUBLIC OF GEORGIA FOR MEMBERSHIP OF THE AGENCY

The General Conference,

- (a) Having received the recommendation of the Board of Governors that the Republic of Georgia should be approved for membership of the Agency,^{1/} and
 - (b) Having considered the application of the Republic of Georgia for membership in the light of Article IV.B of the Statute,
1. Approves the Republic of Georgia for membership of the Agency; and
 2. Determines, pursuant to Financial Regulation 5.09^{2/}, that in the event of the Republic of Georgia becoming a Member of the Agency during the remainder of 1995 or in 1996, it shall be assessed as appropriate:
 - (a) For an advance or advances to the Working Capital Fund, in accordance with Financial Regulation 7.04^{2/}; and
 - (b) For a contribution or contributions towards the Agency's Regular Budget, in accordance with the principles the Conference has established for that purpose^{3/}.

**APPLICATION BY THE REPUBLIC OF BOSNIA AND
HERZEGOVINA FOR MEMBERSHIP OF THE
AGENCY**

The General Conference,

- (a) Having received the recommendation of the Board of Governors that the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina should be approved for membership of the Agency,^{1/} and
- (b) Having considered the application of the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina for membership in the light of Article IV.B of the Statute,
1. Approves the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina for membership of the Agency; and
 2. Determines, pursuant to Financial Regulation 5.09^{2/}, that in the event of the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina becoming a Member of the Agency during the remainder of 1995 or in 1996, it shall be assessed as appropriate:
 - (a) For an advance or advances to the Working Capital Fund, in accordance with Financial Regulation 7.04^{2/}; and
 - (b) For a contribution or contributions towards the Agency's Regular Budget, in accordance with the principles the Conference has established for that purpose^{3/}.

**IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE AGENCY AND THE DEMOCRATIC
PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF KOREA FOR THE
APPLICATION OF SAFEGUARDS IN CONNECTION
WITH THE TREATY ON THE NON-
PROLIFERATION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS**

The General Conference,

(a) Recalling the Board of Governors' resolutions GOV/2436 of 25 February 1993, GOV/2639 of 18 March 1993, GOV/2645 of 1 April 1993, GOV/2692 of 23 September 1993, GOV/2711 of 21 March 1994 and GOV/2742 of 10 June 1994 and General Conference resolutions GC(XXXVII)/RES/624 of 1 October 1993 and GC(XXXVIII)/RES/16 of 23 September 1994,

(b) Noting the Director General's report contained in document GC(39)/18,

(c) Recalling further resolution 825 (1993) adopted by the Security Council of the United Nations on 11 May 1993 and the 31 March 1994, 30 May 1994 and 4 November 1994 statements by the President of the United Nations Security Council, particularly the request to take all steps the Agency may deem necessary to verify full compliance by the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) with its safeguards agreement with the Agency,

(d) Noting that the DPRK has decided to remain a party to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and reaffirming that the IAEA-DPRK safeguards agreement (INFCIRC/403) under the Treaty remains binding and in force,

(e) Noting also the stated intention of the DPRK to come into full compliance with the safeguards agreement and the continuing IAEA-DPRK discussions on outstanding safeguards issues, and

(f) Regretting the withdrawal of the DPRK from the Agency and expressing the hope that the DPRK will rejoin,

1. Strongly endorses the actions taken by the Board of Governors and commends the Director General and the Secretariat for their impartial efforts to implement the IAEA-DPRK safeguards agreement;
2. Commends the Secretariat for its efforts to monitor the freeze of specified facilities in the DPRK as requested by the United Nations Security Council;
3. Expresses concern over the continuing non-compliance of the DPRK with the safeguards agreement and calls upon the DPRK to comply fully with the IAEA-DPRK safeguards agreement;

4. Urges the DPRK to co-operate fully with the Agency in the implementation of the safeguards agreement and to take all steps the Agency may deem necessary to preserve, intact, all information relevant to verifying the accuracy and completeness of the DPRK's initial report on the inventory of nuclear material subject to safeguards until the DPRK comes into full compliance with its safeguards agreement; and
5. Decides to include in the agenda for its fortieth regular session an item entitled "Implementation of the agreement between the Agency and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea for the application of safeguards in connection with the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons".

AN AFRICAN NUCLEAR-WEAPON-FREE ZONE

The General Conference,

- (a) Recalling resolution GC(XXXVIII)/RES/17 of 1994 and all other relevant resolutions and decisions of the General Conference and the Board of Governors,
 - (b) Welcoming the progress made towards the conclusions of a treaty on an African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone, on the basis of the Declaration on the Denuclearization of Africa adopted by the Summit of the Organization of African Unity (OAU) at its first ordinary session, held in Cairo from 17 to 21 July 1964, and of resolution 49/138 adopted on 19 December 1994 by the General Assembly of the United Nations,
 - (c) Noting resolution CM/Res.1592 (LXII)/Rev.1 adopted at the sixty-second meeting of the Council of Ministers of the OAU, which adopted the Pelindaba Text of the Treaty on an African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone on 23 June 1995, and
 - (d) Welcoming the offer of the Egyptian Government to host the Treaty signing ceremony and the offer of the South African Government to host the Headquarters of the African Nuclear Energy Commission,
1. Takes note of the report of the Director General on the establishment of an African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone contained in document GC(39)/14;
 2. Commends the African States for their united efforts directed towards the establishment of an African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone and requests the Director General to continue to assist them in this regard and report on the implementation of this resolution to the General Conference at its fortieth regular session under an agenda item entitled "An African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone";

3. Considers that the establishment of nuclear-weapon-free zones, especially in the Middle East, would enhance the security of Africa and viability of the African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone; and
4. Appeals to the international community, and in particular the nuclear-weapon States, to give the necessary support to the Pelindaba Treaty, especially through their accession to the Protocols that concern them once the Treaty has been adopted.

**IMPLEMENTATION OF UNITED NATIONS
SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS 687, 707 AND
715 RELATING TO IRAQ**

The General Conference,

- (a) Recalling United Nations Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715,
 - (b) Recalling further the resolutions of the thirty-fifth (1991), thirty-sixth (1992) and thirty-seventh (1993) General Conferences (GC(XXXV)/RES/568, GC(XXXVI)/RES/579 and GC(XXXVII)/RES/626), and the resolution of the thirty-eighth (1994) General Conference (GC(XXXVIII)/RES/19), which stressed the need for Iraq to co-operate fully with the Agency in achieving the complete and long-term implementation of the relevant Security Council resolutions,
 - (c) Reaffirming the need for full implementation by Iraq of Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715,
 - (d) Taking note of the Director General's report contained in document GC(39)/10 and of his oral statement to the thirty-ninth General Conference, and
 - (e) Deeply concerned by the evidence, outlined in document GC(39)/10/Add.1, that Iraq in 1990 initiated a crash programme to build a nuclear weapon,
1. Commends the Director General and the Agency's Action Team for their strenuous efforts to implement Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715, and in particular their detection and destruction or otherwise rendering harmless of equipment and materials which could have been used for nuclear weapons, and requests them to continue their efforts;
 2. Welcomes the work done by the Agency towards establishing a mechanism for monitoring future sales and supplies of designated items to Iraq;

3. Notes that with the establishment of a continuous presence of Agency inspectors in Iraq the plan for the ongoing monitoring and verification of Iraq's compliance with its obligations under relevant Security Council resolutions became operational as of the end of August 1994;
4. Urges Iraq to co-operate fully with the Agency in achieving the complete and long-term implementation of the relevant Security Council resolutions, especially regarding the Ongoing Monitoring and Verification Plan;
5. Condemns Iraq for having, since 1991, withheld from the Agency information about its nuclear weapon programme, in violation of its obligations under Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715;
6. Demands that Iraq hand over to the Agency without further delay any currently undisclosed nuclear-weapon-related equipment, material or information, as called for in Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715;
7. Stresses that the Agency will continue to exercise its right to investigate further any aspects of Iraq's past nuclear weapons capability, in particular as regards the new information obtained by the Agency in August 1995 and any further relevant information that Iraq may still be withholding from the Agency; and
8. Requests the Director General to report the views of the General Conference to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and to report to the Board of Governors and to the fortieth regular session of the General Conference on his efforts to implement Security Council resolutions 687, 707 and 715 and decides to remain seized of this issue.

the amounts in the Appropriation Sections to be adjusted in accordance with the adjustment formula presented in the Attachment in order to take into account the exchange rate variations during the year;

2. Decides that the foregoing appropriation shall be financed, after the deduction of

- revenues deriving from Reimbursable Work for Others (Section 8); and
- other miscellaneous income of \$2 637 000 (representing \$1 672 000 plus AS12 256 000);

from contributions by Member States amounting, for an exchange rate of AS 12.70 to \$1.00, to \$210 153 000 (\$36 977 000 plus the equivalent in US dollars of AS 2 199 335 000), in accordance with the scale of assessment fixed by the General Conference in resolution GC(39)/RES/12; and

3. Authorizes the Director General:

- (a) To incur expenditures additional to those for which provision is made in the Regular Budget for 1996, provided that the relevant emoluments of any staff involved and all other costs are entirely financed from revenues arising out of sales, work performed for Member States or international organizations, research grants, special contributions or other sources extraneous to the Regular Budget for 1996; and
- (b) With the prior approval of the Board of Governors, to make transfers between any of the Sections listed in paragraph 1 above.

The General Conference,

**REVISED ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE
ASSESSMENT OF MEMBERS' CONTRIBUTIONS
TOWARDS THE AGENCY'S REGULAR BUDGET**

The General Conference,

- (a) Recalling its resolutions embodying principles for the assessment of Members' contributions towards the safeguards component of the Agency's Regular Budget ^{1/} and operative paragraph 2 of resolution GC(XXXVI)/RES/589,
- (b) Having considered the Board's recommendation in document GC(39)/23 concerning the arrangements for the assessment of Members' contributions towards the safeguards component of the Agency's Regular Budget for each of the years 1996 through 2000,
- (c) Believing that the arrangements now being approved for the period 1996 through 2000 should not prejudice whatever may be decided during that period, and
- (d) Taking note of the Board's intention to continue its efforts to arrive at long-term arrangements for the financing of safeguards,

1. Establishes the following revised arrangements for the assessment of Members' contributions towards the Agency's Regular Budget, to be applicable for each of the years 1996 through 2000, to supplement those contained in resolutions GC(III)/RES/50 and GC(XXI)/RES/351 and to replace those which it approved by resolution GC(XXXVI)/RES/589:

- (a) Each Member's contribution towards the Agency's Regular Budget shall comprise a non-safeguards component and a safeguards component, corresponding respectively to that Member's assessment in respect of:
 - (i) non-safeguards expenses, which shall include all expenses required to be apportioned among Members in accordance with Article XIV.D of the Statute except safeguards expenses; and
 - (ii) safeguards expenses, which shall include all expenses relating to the Agency's safeguards activities.
- (b) Non-safeguards expenses shall be borne by Members in proportion to their respective base rates of assessment calculated by application of the principles set forth in resolution GC(III)/RES/50, as amended by resolution GC(XXI)/RES/351.
- (c) Safeguards expenses, after deduction of such amounts as are recoverable under agreements relating to safeguards between the Agency and parties to such agreements that are not Members of the Agency, shall be borne by Members as follows:
 - (i) each Member included in the list referred to in sub-paragraph (ii) below shall contribute an amount corresponding to one half of its base rate of assessment in respect of the safeguards component of the Regular Budget with the proviso that no such Member shall be obliged to contribute to any increase in the safeguards budget beyond zero real growth;
 - (ii) the list (hereinafter referred to as the "shielded" list), which shall be drawn up by the Director General (and be kept under review by the Board of Governors), shall comprise the Members - except the ten Members with the highest base rates of assessment and those Members which have notified the Director General that they do not wish to be included - having per capita net national products of less than one third of the average per capita net national product of the fifteen Members with the highest per capita net national products, the per capita net national products being identified by examination of the documents used by the Committee on Contributions of the General Assembly of the United Nations and the "shielded" list being reviewed and adjusted, if necessary, each time new documents on per capita net national products are made available by that Committee;

- (iii) any Member not included in the "shielded" list shall contribute on the basis of a scale to be determined for the year in question by proportionately increasing its base rate of assessment in such a way that the total contributions of such Members make up the balance of the safeguards expenses; and
 - (iv) in the case of admission of a new Member of the Agency which is to be included in the "shielded" list referred to in sub-paragraph (ii) above, that Member shall contribute in the year its membership becomes effective in accordance with the provisions set out in sub-paragraph (i) above.
- (d) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-paragraph 1(c)(i) above, the following transitional arrangements shall apply in order to mitigate the burden of significant increases for Members having received partial relief under the existing arrangements in respect of their assessments for the safeguards component of the Regular Budget:^{2/}

- (i) for those Members which remain in the "shielded" list referred to in sub-paragraph 1(c)(ii) above, the contributions shall be determined as follows:

In each of the years 1996 through 1999 the contribution of each Member will be calculated at half of its base rate and then compared with its contribution for 1995. A portion of the resulting difference will be incrementally added to the contribution for 1995, as follows:

in the first year (1996)	-	one fifth of the difference,
in the second year (1997)	-	two fifths of the difference,
in the third year (1998)	-	three fifths of the difference and
in the fourth year (1999)	-	four fifths of the difference.

In the fifth year (2000), each Member included in the "shielded" list will contribute its full share, i.e. in accordance with half of its base rate.

- (ii) for those Members which no longer qualify for inclusion in the "shielded" list, the contributions shall be determined as follows:

In each of the years 1996 through 2004 the contribution of each Member will be calculated in accordance with sub-paragraph 1(c)(iii) and then compared with its contribution for 1995. A portion of the resulting difference will be incrementally added to the contribution for 1995, as follows:

in the first year (1996)	-	one tenth of the difference,
in the second year (1997)	-	two tenths of the difference,
in the third year (1998)	-	three tenths of the difference,
in the fourth year (1999)	-	four tenths of the difference,
in the fifth year (2000)	-	five tenths of the difference,
in the sixth year (2001)	-	six tenths of the difference,

in the seventh year (2002) - seven tenths of the difference,
in the eighth year (2003) - eight tenths of the difference and
in the ninth year (2004) - nine tenths of the difference.

In the tenth year (2005), each of those Members will contribute its full share in accordance with sub-paragraph 1(c)(iii).

(e) These arrangements, applicable for each of the years 1996 through 2000, shall be reviewed by the Board in 2000 at the latest.

2. Requests the Board, in conducting the review referred to in sub-paragraph 1(e), to include consideration of changes in the contributions of "shielded" countries, the criteria for determining contributions, and other relevant issues.

- (b) For a contribution or contributions towards the Agency's Regular Budget, in accordance with the principles the Conference has established for that purpose.

THE CONVENTION ON NUCLEAR SAFETY

The General Conference,

- (a) Welcoming the adoption of the Convention on Nuclear Safety in Vienna on 17 June 1994 and its opening for signature during the thirty-eighth regular session of the General Conference,

(b) Noting the fact that as of 21 September 1995 the Convention had been signed by 61 States, twelve of which had deposited instruments of ratification, acceptance or approval of the Convention,

(c) Expressing its gratitude to the Secretariat for the support it has given to signatory and other interested States in preparing for implementation of the Convention, and

(d) Recognizing that decisions on implementation of the Convention are the responsibility of States Parties,

1. Appeals to all Member States which have not yet done so to sign the Convention;
2. Appeals to signatory States which have not yet done so to ratify, accept or approve the Convention, so that it may enter into force as soon as possible;
3. Expresses the hope that the Convention will obtain the widest possible adherence; and
4. Requests the Secretariat to continue with their support to signatory and other interested States in preparing for implementation of the Convention.

**STRENGTHENING OF THE AGENCY'S TECHNICAL
CO-OPERATION ACTIVITIES**

The General Conference,

(a) Recalling resolution GC(XXXVIII)/RES/8 on "Strengthening of the Agency's technical co-operation activities",

(b) Noting that the objectives of the Agency as stated in Article II of the Statute are "to accelerate and enlarge the contribution of atomic energy to peace, health and prosperity throughout the world" and to ensure that the assistance provided is not used to further any military purpose,

(c) Noting also that one of the statutory functions of the Agency is to "encourage and assist research on, and development and practical application of, atomic energy for peaceful uses throughout the world",

(d) Considering that an expansion of technical co-operation activities relating to the peaceful uses of nuclear energy will contribute to the well-being of the peoples of the world, and particularly those of developing Member States of the Agency,

(e) Stressing the importance of the transfer of nuclear technology to the developing countries for enhancing their scientific and technological capabilities and thereby generating rapid economic development,

(f) Conscious of the great potential of nuclear power for meeting energy requirements in many countries and the need to protect the environment,

(g) Desiring that the Agency's resources for technical co-operation activities be assured and sufficient,

(h) Taking note of the report by the Director General contained in document GOV/2821-GC(39)/13, and

(i) Welcoming the decision to establish the Standing Advisory Group on Technical Assistance and Co-operation (SAGTAC),

1. Stresses the need, in conformity with the Statute, to strengthen technical co-operation activities and also their effectiveness and efficiency;

2. Requests the Director General to pursue, in consultation with Member States, efforts to strengthen the technical co-operation activities of the Agency through the development of effective programmes aimed at improving the scientific and technological capabilities of developing countries, account being taken of the infrastructure and the level of technology of the countries concerned, in the fields of peaceful applications of nuclear energy, including both the applications of nuclear methods and techniques and the production of electricity, and achieving sustainable development;

3. Further requests the Director General to follow-up actions on initiatives mentioned in his report;

4. Requests the Director General to continue to take account of the view of the General Conference on this question when requesting Member States to pledge their respective shares of the Technical Co-operation Fund targets and to make timely payments to the Fund; and

5. Requests the Director General and the Board of Governors to remain seized of this matter and further requests the Director General to report to the Board of Governors periodically and to the General Conference at its fortieth regular session on the implementation of this resolution under an agenda item entitled "Strengthening of the Agency's technical co-operation activities".

**PLAN FOR PRODUCING POTABLE WATER
ECONOMICALLY**

The General Conference,

(a) Recalling resolutions GC(XXXIII)/RES/515, GC(XXXIV)/RES/540, GC(XXXV)/RES/563, GC(XXXVI)/RES/592, GC(XXXVII)/RES/617 and GC(XXXVIII)/RES/7,

(b) Noting the study on the "Technical and economic evaluation of potable water production through the desalination of sea water by using nuclear energy or other means" attached to document GC(XXXVI)/1013, which concludes that the use of nuclear energy as an alternative option to the use of fossil fuelled plants for supplying energy for sea water desalination is technically feasible and in general economically competitive, and document GOV/INF/708,

(c) Noting the main conclusion of the Advisory Group on Demonstration Facilities, attached to document GC(XXXVIII)/8, which includes the conclusion that there is a need to establish a programme for identifying a practical set of options from which one or more demonstration facilities with well-defined objectives might be chosen,

(d) Noting also the interest of a number of Member States in activities relating to sea water desalination using nuclear energy as reflected in document GC(XXXVII)/INF/323,

(e) Aware that the acute shortage of potable water in some Member States remains a major problem, and

(f) Underlining the vital importance of sufficient potable water supplies for mankind and of regional and international co-operation in solving the problem of potable water shortages in Member States and the interest of potential beneficiaries and technology holders in the provision of low-cost potable water,

1. Welcomes the progress made in this regard, and especially the initiation of a two-phase Options Identification Programme (described in document GC(39)/12) which aims at evaluating data relevant to a demonstration programme and analysing the most practical options for demonstration;

2. Urges the Secretariat to secure sufficient funding, through appeals to international organizations and prospective donor countries, so that the second phase of the Options Identification Programme will be completed in 1996 and a final report presented to the General Conference for consideration at its fortieth session;

3. Stresses the need for effective safeguards in order to prevent the use of nuclear energy for prohibited purposes in contravention of safeguards agreements entered into by States and underlining the vital importance of effective safeguards for facilitating co-operation in the field of peaceful uses of nuclear energy;
2. Affirms that increasing the Agency's capability to detect undeclared nuclear activities in contravention of safeguards agreements will contribute to strengthening the effectiveness of safeguards;

- (d) Reaffirming the conviction that the exercise of utmost restraint in respect of nuclear testing would be consistent with the negotiation of a Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, as reaffirmed in United Nations General Assembly resolution 49/70 of 5 December 1994, and recalling the undertaking of the nuclear-weapon States in this regard as well as all the Principles and Objectives for Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament adopted by the 1995 NPT Review and Extension Conference,
- (e) Recalling the important mandate and role of the International Atomic Energy Agency in promoting non-proliferation and also nuclear safety,

(f) Recalling Article III.B.1 of the Agency's Statute, which states that in carrying out its functions the Agency shall "Conduct its activities in accordance with the purposes and principles of the United Nations to promote peace and international co-operation, and in conformity with policies of the United Nations furthering the establishment of safeguarded worldwide disarmament and in conformity with any international agreements entered into pursuant to such policies", and

(g) Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 49/65 of 15 December 1994 on the report of the International Atomic Energy Agency, in which the General Assembly inter alia urged all States to strive for effective and harmonious co-operation in promoting the use of nuclear energy and the application of necessary measures to strengthen further the safety of nuclear installations and to minimize the risks to life, health and the environment,

1. Expresses grave concern at the resumption and the continuation of nuclear testing and calls upon those States which have active nuclear testing programmes in place to desist from testing until a Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty enters into force;
2. Calls upon all States, particularly those with nuclear weapons programmes, to take further effective steps toward fulfilling their obligations as regards nuclear disarmament and the non-proliferation of nuclear weapons;
3. Expects that the negotiations for a Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty will be completed and the Treaty signed in 1996 as may be further specified by the Fiftieth Session of the United Nations General Assembly, and urges all participants in the negotiations to further intensify their efforts to this end;
4. Affirms that cessation of nuclear testing would contribute to the successful conclusion of a Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty and to the promotion of nuclear non-proliferation and disarmament;
5. Recognizes that nuclear testing raises serious concerns about the risks to life, health and the environment;
6. Calls on all States concerned to fulfil their responsibilities to ensure that sites where nuclear tests have been conducted are monitored scrupulously and to take appropriate steps to avoid adverse impacts on health, safety and the environment as a consequence of such nuclear testing;
7. Requests all States concerned to inform the International Atomic Energy Agency of any adverse impact on health, safety and the environment as a consequence of such nuclear testing as necessary to assist the Agency to discharge its functions under the Statute; and
8. Calls for co-operation between the States concerned and the International Atomic Energy Agency in accordance with its Statute in the implementation of the two preceding paragraphs.
